# **UPCOMING EVENTS**



#### BUILDING CAPACITY IN BIOETHICS -EMPOWERING LOCAL COMMUNITIES IN LAOS (11 - 12 MARCH 2025)

The SEA Bioethics Network is hosting a two-day workshop titled Building Capacity in Bioethics: Empowering Local Communities in Laos. This event, bringing together experts and local stakeholders, will focus on key topics such as healthcare ethics, research ethics, disability rights, and grant application skills tailored for the Lao community.

#### **Event Highlights**

- Day 1: Topics will include fundamentals of bioethics, healthcare ethics and research with disabled people. Participants will delve into the foundational aspects of bioethics and access to healthcare among disabled people, with breakout sessions for deeper discussions.
- Day 2: Topics will include ethics in data sharing, culture and bioethics, tips on applying for research grants and publishing.

This workshop aims to strengthen bioethics capacities in Laos and support local communities in addressing ethical challenges in health and research.

Taking place on 27 - 28 May 2025 at the Mahidol Tropical Oxford Research Unit in Bangkok, the event offers a unique opportunity to engage in in-depth discussions on the responsible sharing of health data.

#### REFLECTIONS ON DEVELOPING THE SOUTHEAST ASIA \*\* \*\* BIOETHICS NETWORK AT THE BEST PRACTICE IN **ENGAGEMENT AND CULTURE SYMPOSIUM**

At the Best Practice in Engagement and Culture Symposium, organised by the Wellcome Trust in Bristol, UK, from 15 - 18 July 2024, the SEA Bioethics Network spoke on "Reflections on Developing the Southeast Asia Bioethics Network." Chaired by Dr. Voo Teck Chuan, the session highlighted key activities from the Network's second year. Associate Professor Dr. Tamra Lysaght shared insights on the formulation of the Network's Vision, Mission, and Values, developed through a Delphi survey process during a workshop in Langkawi, Malaysia. Dr. Tay Pek San discussed funding opportunities, providing statistics from the first grant call and plans for improvements in 2025. Dr. Mohammad Firdaus highlighted the Network's collaboration with the Global Forum on Bioethics in Research on AI ethics in health, while Associate Professor Dr. Sharon Kaur presented on the ethical issues surrounding refugees' health in SEA discussed at the network's workshop in Bangkok in February 2024. This session provided an opportunity for attendees to reflect on the Network's progress and contribute ideas for its future direction.



#### \*\* \* GLOBAL HEALTH BIOETHICS NETWORK SUMMER SCHOOL



SEA Bioethics Network members were involved in the 13th Annual Global Health Bioethics Network (GHBN) Summer School that took place in Kuala Lumpur from 19 - 22 August 2024. Four days of intensive discussions on key global health issues were held which included topics on Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR), migration and refugee health, and navigating religious and cultural contexts in bioethics. Experts and participants explored the ethical challenges surrounding AMR, the responsibility of healthcare systems toward migrants, and how cultural and religious beliefs shape healthcare decisions. The event fostered collaborative dialogue, encouraging critical thinking about how bioethical principles can be applied across diverse contexts while respecting human rights and cultural values. With a focus on interdisciplinary exchange, the summer school provided a platform for networking and learning, equipping participants with new perspectives and strategies for addressing urgent global health challenges. The event reinforced the importance of international cooperation in tackling these complex ethical dilemmas.



# **BIOETHICAL FRONTIERS IN** PODCAST SOUTHEAST ASIA



#### PODCAST 1 - GENES TO CHOICES: UNDERSTANDING **GENETIC RISK DISCLOSURE**

In our first episode, we unravelled the mysteries of DNA and its impact on our lives. We explored how family history can illuminate personal health risks and the delicate balance between knowledge and ignorance regarding genetic information. Our guest, Dr. Ong Ai Kiang, Serene, a leading expert in genetic risk disclosure, shared her research on the ethical implications of genetic testing and its effects on family dynamics.

#### PODCAST 2 - NAVIGATING COMPLEXITY: ETHICAL DILEMMAS IN END-OF-LIFE CARE

Our second episode addressed the profound ethical decisions faced by healthcare providers and families when managing end-of-life situations. With Dr. Mark Tan Kiak Min, a respected figure in medical ethics, we discussed the emotional challenges and ethical dilemmas surrounding quality of life and patient autonomy. This episode aims to provide listeners with a compassionate understanding of how to navigate these difficult moments while honoring the dignity of those involved.





#### PODCAST 3 - DATA DILEMMAS: ETHICS IN HEALTH SHARING

In our third episode, we discussed the complexities of health data sharing, an increasingly pertinent issue in today's technology-driven world. We were joined by Professor Dr. Phaik Yeong Cheah from the University of Oxford, who specialises in the ethical considerations of health data sharing. Together, we explored consent, data ownership, and the balance between public health benefits and individual privacy rights, providing a nuanced perspective on how to responsibly manage health data.

#### PODCAST 4 - BRIDGING THE GAP: EOUITY IN SOUTHEAST **ASIAN HEALTHCARE FOR REFUGEES**

In our final episode of this series, we focused on the challenges refugees face in accessing healthcare in Malaysia. With insights from Associate Professor Dr. Sharon Kaur from the Faculty of Law, Universiti Malaya and Dr. Susheela Balasundram from the United Nations High Commissioner For Refugees (UNHCR), we discussed the barriers to healthcare access and the policies that can address these disparities. This episode highlights innovative solutions aimed at improving healthcare equity for refugees in SEA



#### \* DELPHI SURVEY WEBINAR

Following the Delphi Workshop on 9 - 10 October 2023, the SEA Bioethics Network hosted an exclusive webinar on 28 October 2024 to discuss the final outcomes of the Delphi study conducted subsequent to the workshop. The final part of the Delphi study looked into the prioritisation of the Network's activities and research agenda which were identified at the Delphi workshop. With the study now complete and the statements published on the SEA Bioethics website, the webinar invited feedback on refining these statements and strategies for implementing the research priorities. Participants also discussed ways to expand the Network beyond its founding members and contributed to the planned academic output and activities. The webinar was a crucial step in quiding the Network's future direction in bioethics across SEA.



#### \*\* \*\* WHOSE VOICES? - DECOLONISING BIOETHICS WORKSHOP

On 5 November 2024, the SEA Bioethics Network, in partnership with the Center for Bioethics and Medical Humanities (CBMH) at Universitas Gadjah Mada, hosted the workshop "Whose Voices? – Decolonising Bioethics" in Yogyakarta, Indonesia. The event focused on decolonising bioethics, offering diverse perspectives with a particular emphasis on Indonesian viewpoints. Participants explored case studies that addressed the dominance of mainstream narratives, the impact of climate change on Indonesian communities, and the ethical issues faced by marginalised groups. Through these discussions, the workshop aimed to amplify underrepresented voices in bioethics, promoting a more inclusive and diverse approach to ethical challenges in the region.


















#### CELEBRATING ESSAY COMPETITION WINNERS IN **CONJUNCTION WITH GFBR 2024**

The SEA Bioethics Network is delighted to share the results of the Essay Competition held in conjunction with the Global Forum on Bioethics in Research 2024 (GFBR 2024), which took place in Kuala Lumpur this November. This year's GFBR focused on the ethics of research into health and climate change, especially relevant to low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). The competition provided students with a platform to explore ethical issues guiding Malaysian policymakers and researchers in this critical area.

This competition encouraged reflection on the ethical dimensions of health and climate change research. Given the intertwined health of humans and non-humans, research in this area transcends traditional fields, integrating insights from environmental science, veterinary science, and Indigenous perspectives.

#### \*\* \* WEBINAR FOR GRANT AWARDEES

The SEA Bioethics Network hosted a grant awardee webinar on 12 December 2024, providing a platform for grant awardees to present their research and preliminary findings. Chaired by Dr. Mary Chambers of Oxford University Clinical Research Unit (OUCRU), the event fostered engagement with the wider bioethics community and encouraged interdisciplinary collaborations. Associate Professor Dr. Sharon Kaur, Co-Principal Investigator, introduced the Network's objectives, highlighting its impact on bioethics across SEA. Dr. Tay Pek San, Network Lead, followed with updates on funding opportunities, including Research Fellowship Grants, Seed Grants, and Professional Growth Fellowships, emphasising their role in advancing regional bioethics research. Grant awardees showcased diverse projects. Dr. Kathryn Muyskens discussed ethical issues surrounding traditional medicine, promoting international collaboration. Ms. Agnes Bhakti Pratiwi examined patient autonomy in Southeast Asian cultures, focusing on Indonesia. Ms. An Luu and Ms. Alix Day explored ethical and sociocultural aspects of terminally ill patients discharged home to die in Vietnam, aiming to co-develop supportive guidelines. The webinar concluded with a Q&A session, fostering meaningful discussions. This event underscored the SEA Bioethics Network's dedication to culturally sensitive, collaborative bioethics research, addressing critical ethical challenges across SEA.



#### \*\* \*\* ETHICAL ISSUES ARISING IN RESEARCH INTO HEALTH AND **CLIMATE CHANGE**

Our steering committee members, Associate Professor Dr. Sharon Kaur, Professor Dr. Cheah Phaik Yeong, and Dr. Mohammad Firdaus Abdul Aziz, participated in the Global Forum on Bioethics in Research (GFBR) on 19 - 20 November 2024. The forum focused on the ethics of research into health and climate change, with particular emphasis on LMICs. Discussions addressed the ethical challenges of researching interventions to respond to the health impacts of climate change, including impacts on both human and non-

human health. Research in this field often interdisciplinary approaches, drawing from medical, environmental, and sciences. and addressing interconnectedness of human and ecosystem health. The forum also recognized the importance of Indigenous knowledge and perspectives in shaping climate change research. The discussion at the forum highlighted the fact that the specific ethical challenges of health and climate change research remain underexplored. GFBR aimed to engage with these challenges and offer practical tools for researchers in this area.



#### \*\* \*\* PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT TRAINING AND STRATEGY WORKSHOP

The SEA Bioethics Network was involved in a Public/Community Engagement Training and Strategy Workshop on 16 - 17 December 2024 at the Mahidol Oxford Tropical Medicine Research Unit in Bangkok, Thailand. The workshop aimed to strengthen the capacity of the SEA Bioethics Network and the Global Health Bioethics Network (GHBN) to effectively engage with stakeholders and communities throughout SEA. Participants gained key insights into public and community engagement, explored stakeholder mapping and evaluation tools, and collaborated to develop a strategic approach for engagement. The event fostered a shared vision for advancing bioethics in the region through public and community engagement, aligning with the network's mission to promote inclusive and impactful bioethics work.
